Charitable and beloved royals

BORN in the royal town of Seri Menanti on Jan 14, 1948, Tuanku Muhriz Tuanku Munawir was the sole male heir to the ninth Yang di-Pertuan Besar of Negri Sembilan, Tuanku Munawir Tuanku Abdul Rahman, and Tuanku Ampuan Durah Tunku

Besar Burhanuddin.
The grandson of the country's first Yang di-Pertuan Agong Tuanku Abdul Rahman Tuanku Muhammad, Tuanku Muhriz spent his childhood in Negri Sembilan, attending Tuanku Muhammad School in Kuala Pilah, Tunku Besar School in Tampin and later King George V Secondary School in Seremban.

At just 12 years old, he was made Tunku Laxamana, second in rank among the Putera Yang Empat or

four senior princes.

The following year, he was appointed Tunku Besar Seri Menanti, the most senior rank Menant, the most senior rank among the four princes, a title he held until he ascended the throne as the Yang di-Pertuan Besar of Negri Sembilan on Oct 26, 2009.

The young prince furthered his studies abroad and completed his O- and A-Levels at Aldenham School, a prestigious boarding school in England.

It was at this school that Tuanku

It was at this school that Tuanku Muhriz honed his love for music, playing guitar and leading a band called The Prince and the Paupers. The Ruler, who enjoys jazz and music from the 1960s with The Beatles being among his favourite bands, still strums his guitar whenever he has the chance.

This love for music is something Tuanku Muhriz has passed on to

Tuanku Muhriz has passed on to his second prince, Tunku Zain Al-'Abidin, an accomplished pianist and the patron of the Euroasia Association of Performing Arts, which is dedicated to the educawhich is dedicated to the educa-tion, development and promotion of performing arts in Malaysia. After finishing his studies at Aldenham School, the Ruler

attended the University of Wales, Aberystwyth (now Aberystwyth University) – a notable university that has turned out some distinguished students like HRH Prince

guished students like HRH Prince of Wales – where he read law and was a keen sportsman.

Graduating with an LLB (Hons) in 1970, Tuanku Muhriz headed home to Malaysia, where he joined the corporate sector and built a career spanning banking, finance and advertising.

Born on April 26, 1977, Tunku Ali completed his GCSE and A-Levels at Marlborough College in Wiltshire, England, before pursuing a degree in History and Social and Political Science at Cambridge University.

The prince worked abroad for a number of years but since his return, he has been actively involved in charitable causes.

He is currently on the board of trustees of Teach for Malaysia, a non-profit dedicated to ensuring that Malaysian children have equal educational opportunities, and is the chairman of wildlife NGO

WWF-Malaysia. He also completed a Master in Public Administration at Harvard Kennedy School, the public policy and public administration school of the prestigious Harvard University in the US, and is USIM's Pro-Chancellor.

Tunku Zain pursued tertiary education at the London School of Economics and Political Science. graduating with an honours degree in Sociology and Government, and later with an MSc in Comparative

As the president of the Negri Sembilan Squash Association, Tunku Zain is a driving force in the development of the state's sporting talent.

The state has produced several stellar squash players, including US Junior Open champion Harleein

The royal couple's third child, Tunku Alif Hussein Saifuddin Al-Amin, was born on Sept 3, 1984. Hands-on parents, Tuanku Muhriz and Tuanku Aishah Rohani took up courses in the therapy and treatment of children with special needs in the United States in order to give Tunku Alif, who was born with special needs, the best possi-
